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



Our focus and goals




- 1. Recruit members for the existing AgBioData working groups and the consortium
- 2. Develop outreach resources and material to educate about AgBioData, what we do, and how we support the ag research and education community.

DEI at all levels

- Recruit key stakeholders in agricultural research
 - Data generators
 - Biocurators
 - Librarians
 - Publishers
 - *Etc.*
- Specific target
 - Underrepresented communities in ag research
 - Early-career researchers
 - Scientists from less well-funded institutions (domestic and internationals)
- New database resources and scientists representing the large diversity of species used in agriculture
